E&I's Night Service

It's around nine o'clock on a busy Saturday night for the Emergency Service of the Engineer and Installation Division (E & I). Sitting at the Work Order desk, wondering when the next call will come in is Staff Sergeant Ellis Edwards, the Night Duty Foreman. He doesn't have long to wait. "My refrigerator is broken, the light's out, and the ice cream is melting," cries the voice on the other end of the line, "you've got to come out and fix it!" SSG Edwards smiles to himself, and asks the caller whether A) the light bulb had been checked to see if it had burned out B) the fuse box was checked and C) the refrigerator is plugged into the socket. "Well, uh, no," is his reply. The caller is asked to check these things, and call back. Ten minutes later the phone rings again. "I guess the dog pulled the plug out, sorry," comes sheepishly over the phone. Click.

Had there actually been something wrong with the caller's refrigerator, SSG Edwards would have loaned the caller a small, temporary refrigerator (or freezer) for overnight use, and dispatched a mechanic to the caller's residence the next day to repair the broken refrigerator and pick up the temporary one.

E & I has two such temporary refrigerators for use to members of the Berlin-American community, but does not have the facilities for fixing refrigerators at night.

"I've locked myself out of my quarters, is there anything you can do?" is the problem posed by the next call. SSG Edwards instructs the caller to phone the Military Police at 3512. The MPs will then dispatch a patrol car to E & I to pick up emergency keys, check the caller's name against a master roster of names and apartments, and then go unlock the caller's apartment. The MPs will not, however, give the caller the emergency keys, and if the caller has lost his keys, a locksmith will be sent to the caller's apartment to change the locks, at the caller's expense. This service is available to the Berlin-American community on a 24-hour basis.

These are just a few examples of what goes on during E & I's Emergency Service, available to the community from 4:30-10 p.m. daily and 7:30 a.m.-10 p.m. on weekends. An electrician and plumber are on standby after 10 p.m. to take care of any emergencies that might occur at that time.

Emergencies can be anything from reporting a fire to pumping out basements during rainy seasons to checking out furnaces that have gone out. Not to mention broken water pipes and short-circuits. According to Staff Sergeant Lawrence Zarrilli, Self-Help NCO and former Night Duty Foreman, "our two workers average about eight hours a night, answering as many as 21-26 calls. After a call comes in, we get a vehicle from Transportation Motor Pool and make out the work order. Response time is from an hour to an hour and a half."

One of the things SSG Zarrilli stressed to the community was regarding the reporting of a fire. "When reporting a fire, give the address of the fire, not the address from where the call was made. We had a case of a man calling in a fire, giving the wrong address, and consequently the assistance went to the wrong address." With Fire Prevention Safety Week just ending, that's a good tip to follow.

In case any emergencies occur that E & I can help with, call 6646 and either SSG Edwards or Staff Sergeants Joseph Fluellen or Julio R. Gonzales-Cordero will be glad to render assistance.

Mailing deadlines near

With the Christmas season fast approaching it is time once again for soldiers and their families to busy themselves buying gifts. Stores grow crowded with shoppers and passers-by can be heard humming Christmas carols.

It's a pity what happens every year when people don't get their bundles in the mail soon enough to reach loved ones on the big day. The Department of Defense and USAREUR are trying their best to inform soldiers overseas of the latest possible mailing dates.

Space Available Mail, (SAM), parcels weighing a maximum of 70 lbs. and not exceeding 100 inches full measure should be mailed before November 26. SAM letters, tapes, greeting cards, and postcards have a deadline of December 10. Parcel Air Lift, (PAL), packages have a \$1.00 fee attached to them, should weigh no more than 30 lbs. and not exceed 60 inches total measure, should be posted before Dec. 1. Airmail letters, tapes, greeting cards, and postcards have until Dec. 17 at the latest. Airmail parcels, with a maximum of 70 lbs., should be mailed before Dec. 10.

Parcel Air Lift and Space Available Mail offer the cheapest, yet prompt service. All recommended dates are the last possible days to mail and expect delivery by Christmas Day. Normally, patrons should mail one to two weeks before these dates. Postal patrons ordering from the European Exchange System Mail-A-Gift service should allow an additional 14 days for processing and shipment of orders.

In the past the volume of mail processed through USAREUR increased about 200 per cent from November 1 through Christmas Day. To help ease the burden, military community commanders provide APOs with additional personnel, transportation, and workspace on a temporary basis, from October 31 to January 15, 1975.

Köln-an old city with new ideas

Köln — or Cologne, as it is to the rest of the world — is a special city in Germany. With a recorded history beginning approximately 55 B. C., Cologne was a border defense village of the Roman Empire with all of the conveniences of a Roman Town — water system, temples, palaces and baths. Residents of Cologne at this time even enjoyed central air heating. It is from this period that Cologne first became known as a city of culture — a condition that the modern city of Cologne still enjoys.

Although the Cologne of today is almost totally new $(90^{\circ})_{\circ}$ of the inner city was destroyed in WW II) the past is still strong in this city. Most apparent is the rebuilt Dom, Cologne's most famous landmark. It is also apparent in the street plan's of the inner city, that little has been changed from the Roman times. This intermixing of new and old has been a continuous facet of Cologne.

Going to Cologne is no problem, even if you only have a weekend or 3-day pass. There are several planes a day to the city, costing you less than an hour's travel time. If you don't want to pay the fee for this, a second alternative is the Duty Train. Get off in Kassel or Hannover and switch to the Bundesbahn for the rest of the trip. A third alternative is to take the train all the way to Frankfurt, and then on to Cologne via Bonn and the Rhein route. The last route is my favorite as it is one of the most scenic, but the cost is 88 DM for a First Class round trip ticket.

A first concern when you get to any city is where to stay while you are visiting. One of the easiest things to do is book a room through American Express, but if you aren't happy with their selection of hotels, wait until you get to Cologne. About five minutes walk from the station in Cologne is the Verkehrsamt or tourist office. They have complete listings of all available lodging, including any private rooms that are available at the time.

You're in Cologne, and have a place to stay for the night, now what. A start would be to see some of the sights. As you leave the Verkehrsamt the one thing you see first is the Cologne Dom. In fact, you went around the Dom to get to the tourist office, since it is built right alongside the train station. I recommend you start your tour of Cologne right here — the earlier the better since this is the rendevous for almost every one who visits or

lives in Cologne. A quick tour of the Dom will take over an hour — but you could spend six or seven hours just looking at all the stained glass windows. The Dom dates back to 1248, when the first stone was laid for it's construction and since that date construction on the cathedral has never ceased. Even today when you visit, they are still working on it, although now the work is more along the lines of restoration than outright construction.

In order to clear the congestion present in most modern cities, Cologne is in the process of creating pedestrian areas in it's center. One of the first of these is just to your right as you leave the Dom, and the pedestrian area will carry you all the way to Neu Markt, a distance of almost a kilometer. Hohe Strasse is the name of the first part of this street, and in its own right it is also famous. The present Hohe Strasse is built over what has been the main thoroughfare and merchants street of

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

Cologne for over 2000 years — and so it remains today, with the Kaufhof (built in 1914 as the largest department store in the world) still standing. There are four other large department stores along this street, and tucked amongst them is a store from home — MacDonald's and his stateside hamburgers (they haven't changed them either, a piece of meat, a bun, and just enough dressing to keep you from dying of thirst). Other sights along Hohe Strasse include the Rathaus (parts of which date from 1567) and two churches called St. Maria, one dating from 1175 and the other from 1809.

Enough, I can go on about the sights of Cologne all day. Rather than me tell you about them, go and see them yourself.

The AYA girls flag football teams engaged in a Columbus Day double header last Monday. The Bears upset the Sonics in the first game and the Rams captured their second win of the season and possession of first place with a victory over the Jets. The flag football program for girls is the first of its kind in Berlin and although it has not attracted the crowd that the boy's football program has, it will be a success and should remain a permanent fixture in the Berlin American Community. Future games are scheduled for 4 p.m. October 22 and 24 with another double header October 26. The season will end with games November 1 and 2.

Last Saturday the Oklahoma Sooners and USC Trojans fought a stiff defensive battle which ended in a scoreless tie. In Saturday's second game, the Grambling Tigers defeated the Alabama Crimson Tide 20-0. In the final game the Notre Dame offense racked up 46 points, while their defense shut-out the Texas Longhorns. Their 46-0 victory over Texas was the highest score of any team in the league this season and established the Irish as the high scoring team for the season with a total of 98 points.

Next week's games, which will mark the end of the 1974 Bantam League Season, will start at 12 a.m. Sunday. The Alabama Crimson Tide will face the Nebraska Cornhuskers in the opener. Alabama has not won a game all season, and is hungry for a victory in their final game. Nebraska is in first place, and a victory will wrap up the season championship for them. Alabama is a much improved team and is capable of the upset of the season. Texas and Oklahoma have almost equal records. Texas is four games out of first with a 1-4-0 record and Oklahoma has a 1-3-1 record. Each team has scored a total of 20 points for the season. The teams will play out the traditional stateside Texas-Oklahoma rivalry and not without some coincindental sidenotes. Carl Underwood, the Bantam Texas coach, is a former University of Oklahoma

Notre Dame (3-1-1) and Grambling (3-2) also have similar records. A Grambling victory will place them in third and a victory by the Notre Dame Fighting Irish will tie them with USC. A three way tie will exist if Nebraska is defeated this weekend. When the Steelers faced the Vikings last Sunday, it was doubtful they could find 11 uninjured players to field a team. The Steelers did field a team and in the first quarter outplayed the Vikings. Before the first half ended they managed to score a touchdown, but during the second half, the Steelers gave way to fatigue with only one substitute on the bench. The Vikings then ran the score up to 56-6. Doug "Hands" Hansen made several difficult receptions and turned them in to long gains for the Vikings. The Colts defeated the Dolphins in the second game on Sunday. Todd Nelson and Scott scored touchdowns as the Colts won 12-0.







INTERNATIONAL MOTOR VEHICLE LIGHTING EQUIPMENT WEEK



It's your car

The United States Army Europe is participating in the Eighteenth International Motor Vehicle Lighting Equipment Week, October 23-29, which is sponsored by the Federal Traffic Accident Prevention Council (Bundesverkehrswacht) of the Federal Republic of Germany (FRG). The purpose of the international campaign is to encourage motor vehicle owners to prepare their vehicles for fall and winter driving conditions. The Inspection Station, Maintenance Division, Andrews Bks, will check, free of charge, headlights, taillights, stoplights, turn indicators, and windshield wipers of privately owned vehicles belonging to U. S. Forces personnel. A check of brakes and tires will also be included on this free inspection.

In addition to the Maintenance Division participation, the EES garage will check vehicles free of charge during the period October 23-November 29. This will be accomplished in conjunction with normal garage service on a first come, first served, basis.

This courtesy POV inspection is always available at the Maintenance Division Inspection Staion. However, it is particularly important that POV's are in top condition with the approach of winter weather. Therefore, in conjunction with the Eighteenth International Motor Vehicle Lighting Equipment Week, commanders at all echelons are requested to brief motor vehicle owners and encourage participation in this campaign.


One drink may be enough

HEIDELBERG — Beginning November 1, drivers in the Netherlands whose blood alcohol content is found to be .5 milligrams per milliliter of whole blood will be punished for drunken driving. The present figure is .8, the same as that in Germany.

Dutch police use a breathalyzer to make an initial determination of the blood alcohol content. If indications are that this content is .5 or higher, they may ask the driver to submit to a blood test. Refusal to submit to either of these tests constitutes a separate offense.

Even if blood alcohol content is under .5, Dutch police will be authorized to prohibit a person from driving for up to 12 hours.

Penalties for drunken driving in the Netherlands are up to three months in jail, suspension of driver's license for up to five years, and a fine of up to 10,000 Dutch guilders.

Two jeeps mounted with TOW anti-tank missile launcher of Staff Sergeant Reno's section move along the woodline in a field not far from Grafenwoer, West Germany. Suddenly they spot an enemy tank, the gunner goes into action. The crosshairs on his sight centers on the enemy vehicle and the driver simulates firing by flashing the headlights on the jeep. The section has successfully completed clearing all anti-tank obstacles in its sector, making 2-6 Infantry's chance for success in the attack highly probable.

At Grafenwoer, almost 15 kilometers away Specialist 4 Pharis is peering through his binoculars at enemy tanks. He has just finished adjusting in on the tanks and is waiting for the fire-for-effect. Suddenly the radio crackles: "Shots Over", telling him his rounds are on the way. Next he hears: "Splash Over" and before he can answer the transmission he watches the ground around the target explode as the shells from the 4.2 inch morter platoon rip

Specialist 4 Hunter becomes aware of troops in the open, immediately sights his weapon and the machine gun starts "talking", ripping up the cardboard targets 300 meters away. These are members of the Scout platoon, firing a squad qualification course.

All these scenes were just part of the training completed recently in Grafenwoer, by the Combat Support "HELL-CATS" of 2d Battalion 6th Infantry. The company, commanded by CPT John D. Chapla, trained hard to improve their specialized skills necessary to support 2-6 Infantry with reconnaissance, anti-tank and heavy morter support. The company also received cross training as rifle company soldiers as they supported the battalion squad ATT's as aggressors or participated in various live fire ranges. The TOW Platoon on their missile live fire phase was able to give a good account of the level of proficiency of the "HELLCATS". SP4's Kimbell and Prietto, and PFC Witkowski each fired a missile at a moving target the size of a tank turret 2100 meters away and scored hits! Look out enemy tanks!

The company has now returned to Berlin along with the battalion, content in the knowledge that they can competently perform their combat missions as professionals. Although hoping never to have to show its expertice, the company will have the confidence in its weapons, men, and leaders to do the job.




Playground opens
