Checkpoint Charlie-still facing East

On a Berlin street corner, nearly two weeks ago (May 10) workmen closed off half the street and started digging a trench from the sidewalk to the center.

Little notice was taken at the time, but another chapter of history in Berlin was being closed. The old Checkpoint Charlie Control building that has straddled the middle of Friedrich Strasse for nearly 15 years was being torn down to make way for a newer, larger, better building.

On May 20 at 7 a.m. the final work began on disconnecting cables, etc. and raising the building on hydraulic jacks. A flatbed truck backed in at 10 a.m., and the old building was manhandled aboard for its ride to E & I Division where it will be disposed of.

Finally at 1 p.m. the new building was brought in and set in place.

Checkpoint Charlie had a new look.

Looking on was one member of the Berlin Brigade

who was present in August, 1961, when the checkpoint was the focal point of world attention.

"There used to be 85 or 86 crossing points in Berlin, and one third were in the American Sector. I was the Military Police Duty Officer that fateful night of August 12, 1961 and in the early morning hours of August 13 we found out the other side was stopping all traffic."

Lieutenant Colonel Gilbert E. Jones, Berlin Provost Marshal, reminisced about his experiences as a lieutenant in 1961.

"Those were tense times .We were so busy that we really didn't realize just how interested the rest of the world was in us."

LTC Jones continued, "We first had some MP's standing in the middle of the street checking the traffic, then finally we got the present building in October. The building the French and British use was added later in the spring of 1962."

"As I think back, a lot happened during those early months. Vice President Johnson came to visit. A battle group came through the autobahn, and we were reinforced by a platoon of MPs from the 385th MP Battalion in Stuttgart. They were known as the '40 hired Guns' and I think those words are carved somewhere inside the old checkpoint building."

"A lot of people always asked us why we called this particular place Checkpoint Charlie? Any military person knows the phonetic alphabet and with Checkpoint Alpha at Helmstedt, and Checkpoint Bravo near the Wannsee, it was just the logical GI way of naming it."

The old building isn't quite ready for the scrap pile yet. The front section that faced the east will be set up in the Berlin Brigade Museum at McNair Barracks as a reminder of the way it used to be.

The last weekend in May has entertainment for the most diversified tastes.

Have you been out to Europe's most modern trotting race tracks? Sunday would be a good day to look at the Mariendorf track with its huge tribune. There are plenty of eating and drinking facilities. Excellent place for people and girl watching!

At the Academy of Arts in the Hansa District the opportunity to see dancers of the Berlin Opera perform their own choreographic work is

available. Two experimental ballet evenings are scheduled for Saturday and Sunday at 8 p.m. Tickets cost between DM5 and 10 and are available at the door.

"Abafumi" is the name of the theater from Kampala, Uganda, that will play in the Academy of Arts Tuesday thru Thursday. It aims at creating an independent African theater, which has its roots deep in traditional African culture but incorporates the present-day problems of the continent. The ensemble tries to play so audiences of Africa can understand their message. Times and prices are the same as for the ballet performances.

A small rock festival will take place in the Taverne am Lützowplatz on June 4 (8 p.m.). Four hours of international rock featuring "War" from the States, "Randy Pie" and "General" from Budapest cost DM12 if you get your tickets ahead of time. The night of the show you pay DM15 at the door.

3-6 holds cross-country race

The CQ looks at his watch: it's 03:45, a Friday morning. Before going upstairs and waking up the troops, he sits back for one more cigarette. "Give them five more minutes of sleep," he thinks to himself. Five minutes later he makes his way up to rooms 210, 211 and 216. "It's time to get up, lets go guys," he says. As some soldiers of the 3rd Battalion, 6th Infantry moan and groan about

getting up, a few sit up on their bunks. Thoughts are not yet running through their minds too fast, but the few who can think at such an early hour, have but one thought: "He's got to be crazy, Spot and his PT program. Who on God's green earth wants to wake up facing a three mile cross-country run with full combat gear on?"

At 05:00 hrs the entire 3rd Battalion is standing on Defender field at McNair Compound. It's cloudy this morning but things are beginning to move. Decked out in web gear, M16' and M203s are 176 men. Some are carrying 22 pound radios on their backs. These men are part of 28 teams who are about to participate in a Berlin first. A battalion Cross-country combat race. The winning team will receive a three-day pass and a trophy.

After the battalion formation, 176 men move out to board the OD green buses which are waiting to take them to their final destination, the AYA field near Berlin Brigade headquarters. The three-mile run starts here and the finish line is at a Berlin park a couple miles away near Onkel Tom Strasse.

This is the way it started, but it didn't finish with the same "we gotta do it attitude" that was portrayed by most soldiers at 04:00 that morning. The 298th Army Band and cheering soldiers were well positioned at the finish line when SGT Robert Hall, Co. "B," came bursting across the white tape to be the first soldier of the battalion to complete the three-mile run. That didn't mean his team had placed first! As each man came across the finish line, he was handed a card with the number in which he came in. At the end of the race when all the runners are in, the numbers on the card are totaled for the group. The team which has to lowest score wins. In this run, 2nd platoon of Charlie Company took first place. Support platoon of HHC 3/6 came in second.

When saying that the entire 3rd Battalion Combat Team was there, that also included the cooks who had set up tents and tables and cooked eggs to order for the hungry runners and team supporters. By this time, the soldiers were showing much more enthusiasm as they watched the scoreboard and ate breakfast.

"Sure, it was a drag," claimed Sp4 Anthony Law, the battalion mail clerk, "when I first hit the floor this morning, but now it's fun." "It's great for the body, mind and soul," said another soldier.

After all the team scores were in, MG R. Dean Tice presented the award to Charlie Company's winning team. His comments were brief, but to the point, as he said, "This is a first for Berlin, to have such an event as this, and I think it's great!" With this type of support coming from the Commanding General it only proves that the Spirit of adventure and determination are part of the soldiers of the 3rd Battalion.

4-6 medic wins award

Prescribing pills and sticking a thermometer in a patient's mouth are not all there is to being a medic in the "ALL THE WAY" Battalion as SSG Robert C. Pugh proved this week upon his return from Aschaffenburg,

SSG Pugh has just brought back with him the Expert Field Medical Badge (EFMB), the most coveted decoration worn by an individual in the military medical profession. Not only did he earn the badge, but he attained the highest score this year in Europe by racking up 1072 out of a possible 1200.

SSG Pugh had to go mostly on what he learned through his military experience, since he didn't have time to prepare for the test. Due to the amount of time

2-6 mechanics in field

"The men of the 'Second to None' Battalion have come to appreciate their mechanics for the long, hard job they do in undesirable conditions," stated WO Charles Adams. When an infantry battalion goes to the field, the first thought on everyone's mind is the misery of infantry soldiers marching the hills.

"When the infantry soldiers have quit for the night and start relaxing, my men are working on their vehicles," said Adams. The mechanics for the 2nd Bn., 6th Inf. motor pool have 120 vehicles that must be kept in top condition even with the hard wear and tear received in simulated combat conditions.

To do this, 19 mechanics do everything from light maintenance to Direct Support Maintenance (DSM). Actually, the men enjoy the chance to do DSM; which is much more of a challenge than their normal work.

"We like the DSM in the field, it's a highly skilled work where we replace a transmission instead of a carburator," said SGT Curtis Ethington, one of the school-trained DSM mechanics at the battalion. Changing a transmission in the middle of a rain storm while fighting mud below and the chills within the body does make the job

The convoy trips to MTA's can be a nightmare for the mechanics. On the way to Hohenfels for training, seven breakdowns occured, and one vehicle failed to make it under its own power. The mechanics worked nights after the convoys stopped to make the needed repairs.

he devotes to his job (which included coming in every day during a seven-day leave) as medical platoon sergeant for Headquarters, 4-6 there wasn't much left for studying. He had to rely on his first-hand knowledge. "He's the best we've got," stated PVT Joe A. Bartlett, commenting on what he thought of SSG Pugh as a professional medic.

The test, given in Aschaffenburg, consisted of a fourday cycle, testing not only medical subjects, but NBC, Military Courtesy, Military Intelligence, Map and Compass, Communications, a PT test, and a twelve-mile road march as well. There were twelve stations each with a possible 100 points.

SSG Pugh felt that the litter obstacle course was the most difficult and that the NBC portion of the test was the best administered by the examiners.

During the EFMB test, there was a particularly interesting portion which involves extracting wounded from various vehicles, including a tank, and loading the wounded on every type of vehicle, from a chopper to a gamma goat. A different procedure is used for each vehicle and all aspects had to be tested.

There was also a written examination of 150 questions. SSG Pugh summed up the written and practical portions of the test by stating. "All of the must know things that a medic has to know in the field were there."

Six inspectors to solve problems

Are you having problem with military equipment? Is the paperwork associated with the equipment driving you crazy? Worried about an upcoming inspection?


If the answer to any of these questions is yes, then you need to call the Berlin Brigade Maintenance Assistance and Instruction Team (MAIT) for help. This team consists of six highly skilled inspector/instructors whose sole task in the Berlin Brigade is to help you solve equipment problems. Although the team is highly trained as maintenance inspectors, the primary mission is to assist and instruct. NOT TO INSPECT! In fact, MAIT is forbidden by Army Regulation to participate in any type of command inspection.

The MAIT does not perform actual work for units, but, if need be, we'll work it out together. In other words, your mission will become our mission. When MAIT members visit a unit they focus on many areas. However, the main thrust is to improve the unit's maintenance capabil-

Anyone can request the assistance of the MAIT. After the MAIT visit is completed, an exit briefing is given to the requestee along with a written report. No one else is given a copy of that report. It is strictly a confidential doctor-patient relationship report. This informal report outlines the Assistance and Instruction provided by MAIT and recommendations for improvements as well as any special problems observed. After receiving the report and recommendations for corrective action, it is then the unit or section's responsibility to make corrections. If requested, MAIT will revisit you after corrections have been made and spot check or provide additional assist-- MAIT ance.


Grimes takes first at Invitational


College football at Olympic Stadium

"Some things just can't be taught in the classroom," said Sally Marr, teacher and organizer of the Outdoor Education Workshop at TAR School.

Officially, USDESEA feels that expanding the walls of the classroom to include the outdoors provides valuable learning and reinforces classroom study. Basically, some things can be better learned by doing.

Marr, who was in charge of the one-day workshop to familiarize TAR teachers with OE (Outdoor Education) techniques, explained their goals, "Becoming aware of our environment is the first step; then, students will care for and love it; finally, we hope they will consciously work to preserve it."

OE provides situations in which people can learn to trust each other, by standing in the center of a circle with one's eyes closed, falling backwards, expecting a fellow student to catch you.

Or interdependence among people and between elements of our environment; for example plants need water, light, and a space to grow.

Or working together to achieve a common goal as shown by a group of teachers roped together, prohibited from talking, and trying to crabwalk downstairs and into the school yard.

The teachers were divided into groups and proceeded through six stations in round-robin fashion.

They passed through the "Web of Life," compass orientation, Geology, Crab Walk, and even a scavenger hunt, learning how to teach their students about their environment and themselves.

Sally's words seem better than the official ones as she said, "Students get a chance to realize their strengths and weaknesses and not feel bad; they learn to accept them-

"They also learn and it's maybe more important about the strengths and weaknesses of others and become receptive to ideas from others."

She ended with "People build a positive self-image and a feeling of individual worth from accepting and conquering challenges.

But it is just as important to stress to students that participation and doing your best is most important and just as valid as success.'




EXTENSIONS

The Army will experience a high level of personnel turbulence associated with the summer months (May-Aug) and the recurring summer support requirements for ROTC and Reserve training.

To maintain as high a level of trained strength as possible during this period, special emphasis is being placed on encouraging soldiers who are scheduled for separation during May-Aug '76 to extend their enlistment several months. In this regard, commanders are enjoined to identify those soldiers who are planning to attend school in the fall or who still have several months between separation from the Army and civilian employment, and encourage them to extend their enlistments for the intervening period of time. The benefit of assured employment and income while awaiting the start of the fall school term or civilian employment should be stressed as an inducement.

Commanders are encouraged to be liberal in their approval of extensions during this period and to give this matter their personal attention.
